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#### SARAH COLLINS AT UN YOUTH CLIMATE SUMMIT IN NEW YORK



'One of the main things I learned was how climate change is affecting women most. The UN provided figures which show that 80% of people most affected by climate change are women. Women are being forced to walk for miles upon miles in dangerous heat to fetch water as their towns are suffering from drought' – Sarah Collins

First year BSc Government and Political Science student, Sarah Collins, was among 100 young people chosen from 7,000 applicants around the world to bring their experiences of climate activism to New York on Saturday for the United Nations Climate Summit.

While Swedish activist, Greta Thungerg, attracted much media attention, Sarah and the two other Irish delagtes made their voices heard too. Speaking before departing for the Big Apple, Sarah said:

'We'll be meeting young people who are directly affected by climate change and we'll be able to hear their stories and bring them back to Ireland. Hopefully, we'll also get our message across to world leaders so that they understand how Irish people feel about the climate crisis, how passionate we are and how we want change now.'

# SKY IS THE LIMIT FOR ENTREPRENEUR MARY



In June, Sky has announced its second cohort of Women in Technology Scholars, awarding five talented women, two of whom are Irish, a total of £125,000 (€140,000) to accelerate a business idea that harnesses technology innovation.

Of the two successful Irish women is **Mary Murphy** (BSc Government 2). At 20 years of age, Mary is the youngest Sky Women in Tech Scholar (on far right of picture above). She designed and manufactured a sheep-marking gun with her sister to combat everyday problems she and her family faced on their county Mayo farm. Unlike the standard option available, the sheep-marking gun is a single-handed device, allowing the farmer to hold the sheep in one hand and mark it with the other. As part of the scholarship, Mary plans to continue engineering agritech products, including a GPS tracker system for sheep to prevent them being stolen or attacked by predators.

Mary is also a Quercus Innovation/Entrepreneurship Scholar and the winner of the 2019 UCC Student Entrepreneur of the Year.

#### Work Placement Report from Áras an Uachtaráin

I was lucky enough to be given the opportunity to undertake my work placement as a Temporary Executive Officer at Áras an Uachtaráin from April to September of this year as part of my MSc in International Public Policy and Diplomacy.

Essentially, I was tasked with how to effectively aid the three presidential initiatives, beginning with 'Achieving Equality: Participation and Transformation'. Throughout the placement, I was placed in charge of co-ordinating a seminar on the subject of the Spanish Flu, working closely alongside the Deputy Secretary-General. I assembled a publication on the Spanish Flu seminar and I personally drafted the Presidential Foreword. I enhanced my research and time-management skills in the composition of forewords and speeches and I assisted protocol in the organisation and implementation of various events, including seven Garden Parties.

Certainly, the work experience was unique and thoroughly enjoyable, something which was made possible because of all the staff and my tranquil surroundings in Phoenix Park. I believe that work placements such as that which I conducted in Áras an Uachtaráin, strengthen the learning acquired in academic studies and are a necessary and practical component. My experience has proven beneficial and positive and I am certain that the skills and experience I have acquired will be transferable to future work opportunities.

## Remembering when the Speaker of the House of Commons, John Bercow MP, visited us in 2013

The Annual Philip Monahan Memorial Lecture – the showcase event each year for the Department of Government and Politics – was delivered in 2013 by the Speaker of the House of Commons, John Bercow MP. He spoke about the relationship between the legislature and the executive and his words are extremely relevant today.

He said, 'A legislature which simply passed laws but had no interest in or influence over the implementation of those Acts and policy more generally would be an unimpressive institution. A serious legislature must be capable of intensive scrutiny and have the capacity to challenge the executive. Ministerial appearances in the House should be a courteous nerve-wracking experience.'

# Public Lecture in Dublin – Sir Henry Campbell: From Parnellite to Pariah

On Tuesday 8 October, Dr. Aodh Quinlivan will be delivering a public lecture in the historic council chamber of Dublin City Hall. The lecture is entitled **Sir Henry Campbell: From Parnellite to Pariah.** There were two distinct parts to Henry Campbell's life. In the first part, he served as the loyal confidant and private secretary to Charles Stewart Parnell and was also elected as a Member of the House of Commons. Campbell supported his friend and party leader during the Parnell Commission of 1888-1889 and during the infamous divorce case, which followed Parnell's affair with Kitty O'Shea. After the demise and death of Parnell, Campbell was appointed as Town Clerk of Dublin Corporation, a position he held for 28 years. He was sacked in December 1920 for refusing to obey the decision of the Sinn Féin majority council not to submit the accounts of the Corporation to the Local Government Board for auditing.

# 2020 – Two Books and the Fifth Annual Public Lecture Series

Two books will be coming out of the CLRG in 2020, both written by Dr. Aodh Quinlivan. *Vindicating Dublin: The Story Behind the Controversial Dissolution of the Corporation in 1924* will be published in the spring, through Dublin City Libraries and Four Courts Press. As the title indicates, the book chronicles the public inquiry which led to the dissolution of Dublin Corporation in 1924. The Corporation was suspended until 1930 when it retuned, with Gerald Sherlock appointed as the capital's first City Manager. The book has already received many favourable reviews, including:

'A fascinating look at a little-known episode which reveals new insights into the history of the newly independent State. Essential reading for anyone interested in the development of the Free State, and local government in Ireland' – **David McCullagh**, **Journalist and author**.

'Vindicating Dublin provides an intriguing insight into the process of centralising political power in the new Irish state, a process which has resulted in Ireland having very weak local government, and particularly so in its national capital' – David Farrell, Professor of Politics, University College Dublin

'Vindicating Dublin reveals the tensions between newly-independent Irish Free State and Dublin Corporation which controlled the capital city – an interesting insight into the Irish relationship between national and local politics, and a hidden part of the history of modern Ireland and modern Dublin' – Mary E. Daly, Professor of Modern Irish History, University College Dublin

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The second book coming out of the CLRG in 2020 charts the political life of Donal Óg O'Callaghan. O'Callaghan is Cork's forgotten Lord Mayor, being the third person to hold that office in 1920, following the deaths of his two predecessors, Tomás MacCurtain and Terence MacSwiney. O'Callaghan was Lord Mayor of Cork until 1924, during which time he was also Chairman of Cork County Council. He spent much of this period on the run, initially from British authorities and, after the Treaty, from the Irish! He also served as a TD in 1921-1922. The target is to launch the book about O'Callaghan in the council chambers of Cork City Hall on 4 November 2020 – 100 years since he was elected Lord Mayor on 4 November 1920.

• A highlight on the calendar for the CLRG is the Annual Public Lecture Series. It's hard to believe it, but the 2020 series will be the fifth we have run. The event will take place in February or March 2020, with details to be announced in due course. As part of the proceedings, the CLRG undergraduate and postgraduate awards will be presented.

# Cork County Councillor and BSc Government Student!



Last May, while still in BSc Government I, Ben Dalton O'Sullivan became the youngest person to be elected to Cork County Council representing the Greater Carrigaline area. Running as an Independent, Ben ran a shoestring campaign armed only with eight posters, a handful of leaflets and one canvasser most nights.

Ben spoke to *Cork Beo* (https://www.corkbeo.ie/news/local-news/corks-youngest-councillor-elected-16340868) about the moment he found out he had been elected. 'It was just shock. You canvas and you talk to people and you ask them to give you their number 1 and then I just couldn't believe that people had actually given it to me. It was just shock that they chose me to represent them'.

Ben hopes to be a voice for the elderly and resolve issues that he encountered while canvassing. 'I think older people have been forgotten, older people who might be carers and are looking after a loved one. One woman in Carrigaline was in her 70s and she was caring for her daughter and when she applied to the council for a Housing Adaptation Grant they gave her a big load of forms and that was it. It is people like her who would like to have a councillor that they can go to and ask for help, it will be good for them'.



In the same electoral area as Ben, the Green Party's **Catriona Reid** very narrowly missed out on a seat in Cork County Council. Catriona is a new first year student on the BSc Government and Political Science. The *Carrigdhoun Weekly* newspaper conducted an interview with Catriona in advance of the local elections –

#### Art O'Leary – New Adjunct Professor in the Department of Government and Politics

Senior civil servant Art O'Leary has been appointed as an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Government and Politics. Art is currently the Secretary General to the President of Ireland, Michael D. Higgins. Prior to his move to Áras an Uachtaráin, Art was Principal Officer in the Department of the Taoiseach. He has also served as secretary to the Convention on the Constitution.

Born in December 1966, he was educated at Ard Scoil Rís, Marino, and later received an MBA from Henley Business School. He joined the Department of Social Protection in 1984 and the Houses of the Oireachtas in 1990.

Its role was twofold: to assist in the deliberative design and format of the Convention and conduct primary research on the Convention's deliberative processes and outcomes.




## Robert Elgie 1965-2019

Robert was a great friend of the Department of Government and Politics at UCC and he was rightly recognised as a global figure and leading authority in comparative politics. Robert enjoyed many standout moments in an exceptional career - he was the founding head of the School of Law and Government at DCU and the founding co-editor of the journal *French Politics*. Anne's Viva was chaired by UCC's Professor Cathal O'Connell and her three examiners were Professor Tony Bovaird (Birmingham University), Dr. Bernadette Connaughton (University of Limerick) and Dr. Clodagh Harris (University College Cork).

Congratulations, Anne, for all of your hard work over the past six years.




